Reportage Ghana: Rashid brings news from Sawla

Rashid returned to Barcelona in early March, after almost a couple of months in Ghana and here are some of the exciting news he brings back!

During the first weeks of Rashid's trip, Peter Donaldson and Maria Muñoz accompanied Rashid to support the brainstorming of future possibilities for the farm of CEHDA. The aim: inspiring others into sustainable agriculture grounded in local needs and resources.



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Peter is a Masters student in the Online Graduate Programs in Human Rights Practice at The University of Arizona as well as an established international agriculture consultant. Maria also carries a wealth of experience growing vineyards over many years. Currently, CEHDA is discussing with them several exciting possibilities of collaborations for the development of Peter's capstone project in Ghana. More news to come soon in this regard.

In addition, Peter and Maria, together with their colleagues and friends, are pulling together resources, time and efforts to support several other CEHDA initiatives. One of them, in which you can also join, is the reparations and conditioning of the service van we purchased in Spain with the support of Ajuntament de Sant Vicenç dels Horts.





We are converting it into a passenger van (a tro-tro, as we say in Ghana) to serve the community of Sawla and their surroundings. Windows need to be installed in the van as well as comfortable seating for travelers. Rashid not only travelled to Sawla to oversee the state of our projects there but also visited Tema, Accra, Kumasi and Tamale to coordinate the arrival of the container with the donations received via the Fundació Banc de Recursos of Barcelona, as well as donations from many individuals.

We admit it wasn't easy to sort out all of the bureaucracy hoops and loops to import those materials to Ghana. But, with the support of many volunteers in Ghana, Catalunya as well as with the leadership of Rashid, the container arrived at Sawla on March 18th.









The educational materials and furniture are now in the premises of the "Children's Project" ready to be used as soon as we resume classes. We highlight the books donated by the BCN Languages School. The classroom chairs donated by the Benjamin Franklin International School and La Poderosa theatre and dance company. The black board, cork board, and clothes donated by INS Santa Eulàlia from Terrassa. As well as the office furniture offered by Sembra. And the school materials received from Escola Iris at Sant Vicenç dels Horts. In addition, we received donations from friends and collaborators in Catalunya that are contributing to enrich the opportunities and the lives of many: thank you all for the sewing machines, clothes, printers, and more! They all have been sorted and will be put into good use. We will keep you posted.

As for the vehicles donated, we have them at the mechanic shop and they are being tuned up or repaired. The nine motorbikes donated by B:SM will be employed, together with the passenger van mentioned above, for the transportation of children to CEHDA's compound as well as to serve the community of Sawla and surroundings as a local tro-tro. These vehicles will enable more people in Sawla to reach local markets where to sell their produce, do cultural visits for the children in CEHDA's project and coordinate multiple tasks of CEHDA in Ghana. During this trip, Rashid and Mette Brogden, a cultural and medical anthropologist and assistant professor from the **University of Arizona**, have also been working under the newly created ghanaian organization **The World Institute for African Culture and Traditions (WIACT)** to support the revitalization of indgenous traditions in the area. Among other activities, Rashid met with the Traditional Council of the recently created **Savannah region in Ghana** to propose a project that will rebuild the Gonja Traditional Palace at Nyaŋε.
